Reframing the Constitution

Two-hundred and thirty years after its ratification, the U.S. Constitution remains one of the most difficult to amend of any in the world. During this week we ask if the Constitution is securing the “blessings of liberty” for all Americans and whether constitutional reform — from amendment to outright replacement — is necessary and even possible.

- We look at constitutional politics to understand the “unamendability” of the U.S. Constitution, consider resistance to a constitutional convention from both the political left and right, and determine what we can learn from younger democracies around the world.

Cost

Week Eight • \$950 per person

Week Nine • \$980 per person

Pricing includes lodging, breakfast and dinner, and a Chautauqua gate pass that provides admission to all Amphitheater programs. Reservations will be confirmed upon receipt of registration and \$100 deposit on a **first-come basis** by mail or email. Once sold out, names will be placed on a waiting list. (Please be sure to include your email address on the reservation form for faster confirmation.)

The total balance is due on June 1. After June 1, all deposits are non-refundable. We recommend that you consider purchasing third-party trip cancellation insurance.

Add-on Options

A limited number of single rooms or private baths are available for an additional \$250 per request. Parking in the Main Lot can be paid (\$60) when making final payment. If you’re arriving early Sunday and wish to have a parking pass, please purchase a one-week parking pass at the Main Gate Ticket Office for \$60. No need to order one with registration.

Tickets for Chautauqua Theater Company productions are available for both weeks and can be purchased at the Ticket Office, by phone at 716-357-6250 or online at chqtickets.com. The Chautauqua Cinema movie schedule will be available upon arrival.

Facilities and Services

Lodging is available at Bellinger Hall, a modern two-story retreat center featuring double rooms (2 twin beds in each) with shared, connecting bathroom. Towels and bedding are provided.
